

In the Lowcountry, there are very few opportunities to have children suspected of having Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) diagnosed. Currently, parents have two choices when suspecting their child has ASD, wait for an opening at the Medical University of South Carolina (MUSC) or DDSN, both of which have more than a 12 month waiting lists and only see children under the age of 5. The other option is to pay a private provider between \$2,500-\$8,000 for the assessment. Without a diagnosis, many families can't access the care and services they need. The Lowcountry Autism Foundation saw the frustration in our families and parents and COUNDATION created the ADOS program, which has no wait time and sees individuals up until the age of 17. It also erases a financial barrier that may be stopping a family from accessing the care they need and deserve. Not only do we offer the in-house developmental pediatrician; have also partnered with NorthStar Center for Autism and Wright Directions to assist in evaluations whenever we are unable to do it "in house". Since May 2024, we have been able to diagnose 10 children and get them and their families connected with the appropriate resources. This has been possible due to the Children's Relief Fund providing a generous grant to our organization. These funds have been used to pay for the autism evaluations and with an early diagnosis children and families experience less stress, better mental health, a reduction in Autism symptoms, stability at home, and an overall higher quality of life. We want to sincerely thank the Children's Relief Fund for supporting our mission, the ADOS program, and the families that we serve.

Children's Relief Fund Empowering Our Children One Stride At A Time The support of Children's Relief Fund to the equine therapy program at Heroes on Horseback continues to be one of the longest and largest collaborations in HOH's 24-year history. For nearly a quarter of a century, tens of thousands of children have been impacted by this unique form of therapy that targets physical, emotional, and mental challenges including learning disabilities, autism, cerebral palsy, downs syndrome, ADD and ADHD, and muscular dystrophy.

The goals of HOH's equine therapy fall into two primary categories: physical enrichment which includes the recovery of physical abilities, improved balance and coordination, greater strength and muscle control and increased range of motion; and emotional and mental progress which includes increased confidence and self-esteem and improvements in language, cognitive abilities, and social skills. Every participant in the program is evaluated prior to the start of their equine therapy session, and measurable goals and objectives from their involvement are defined with caregivers including parents, teachers, therapists, and others.

HOH never turns anyone away from the benefits of the healing and empowerment of their program for financial reasons, with 90% of its costs funded through contributed income. The funding provided by Children's Relief Fund helps to cover the expenses of therapy horses and certified instructors leading the lessons. During the last year, Children's Relief Funded also helped HOH with the costs to acquire a new therapy horse, appropriately named, "Angel." There are many success stories of children benefiting from the equine therapy funded by Children's Relief Fund.

Many of these children and young adults have experienced the thrill of winning medals and ribbons competing at state, national, and world games hosted by Special Olympics. To say that this level of success is important to the development of any special needs individual is an understatement.

The generosity of Children's Relief Fund has always been vital to improving the lives of our special needs community. The 20-plus years of collaboration between Heroes on Horseback and Children's Relief Fund has proven time and again that children, regardless of the challenges facing them, can learn, improve and be their best.





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
